Arranging a Case

LINERS: Many cases do not need liners. The inside of the case has been stained or painted to blend pleasingly with the contents. If the liner is needed a piece of material may be draped in the case or PIECES of masonite or veneer can be cut to fit the sides and back of the case then covered with a lightweight material. This material is cut with enough material on the edges to fold neatly over the back of the board and taped down. Material should be of a neutral color so your display is the first thing your eye sees rather than the color of the box.

RISERS: Risers are used to raise parts of the display to different levels to make individual parts outstanding. Styrofoam may be cut and used across the back of the case – usually two or three inches thick and draped or covered with the same material as the liners. Rounds or squares may also be cut out from cardboard and covered also to emphasize your pieces.

HOW MANY THINGS SHOULD I PUT IN THE CASE: From 5 to 35 depending on the size of the articles. If they are quite large only 5. It is better to have too few than too many. If the contents have a cluttered look, the eye will slide right over your case and not really see anything. (The Ventura Fair rules state 10 -35 items).

HOW DO I ARRANGE THE PIECES: Keep away from straight lines. Again, the eye will slide right over the line and not stop at anything. Keep your largest, your darkest, or your heaviest looking for your center of interest. Center of interest is usually center back of case but it can also be to one side or the other and the rest of the exhibit arranged accordingly. Keep an item on one riser, don't drape it from one riser to another. Keep jewelry off the back of the case.

Arrange your case so it looks balanced on both sides. Such as a large piece on one side and a corresponding mass on the other.

Arrange your pieces so the eye is led from one article to another. For instance, if you have three rows, arrange the items so the eye is led from a bottom article to the second row up to the top in a diagonal line. Arrange all your articles in this manner so no matter which item you see first it will lead you on a diagonal line of the three.

LABELS: Every item should have a label, every label spelled correctly. Size about 2.5" long x .5" to 1" wide. The first things one's eye should see in the case are the items you are displaying. If your eye sees the label first, our label is too prominent.

Lapidary – Name the material in capital letters.

Where it came from. Only first letter of words in caps.

Beads – Name of items in caps

Name material, only first letter of each word in caps.

Name location of material if known, 1st letter of each work in caps.

Jewelry – Name item in caps

Name technique used, 1st letter of each word in caps.

Name gem material if any used. 1st letter in caps.

Minerals – Species name in caps.

Variety 1st letter in each word in caps.

Fossils – Common or scientific name in caps.

Location if known 1st letter of each word in caps.

October 16th Sat Ant Hill Area, Bakersfield, CA, 10am-3pm Tri club field trip.

Our October field trip will be to the Ant Hill area, near Bakersfield California. Come out for a fun day of digging for shark teeth fossils, the weather should be nice, cool. The dig site is a walk of 500 yards over semi flat ground, then up a hill 100 yards. Once you are there most of the time you'll be digging in small area. This time of the year there is always the chance of rain, bring the necessary clothing. If it is raining, we won't be digging.

When: October 16th. Sat. 10am-3pm

Directions: 5 Freeway North, to the 99 Hwy North, off at 178 Hwy East, near Bakersfield, go 8.3 miles to the Harrell Hwy, turn Left/North. 3.5 miles on the Harrell Hwy from the 178 Hwy. Site is on the Left/South side of Hwy, by the hills. My white Ford F-250 truck will be there, with a CGMC/VGMS sign in the window. We will be about 2.5 miles East of Hart Park. You should see an asphalt bike path going up the hill. Then you know you're at the right spot. Ant Hill is 136 miles from my house in Thousand Oaks, drive time 2 to 2.5 hours.

Tools: Rock pick/hammer, gad pry bar, hand sledge, sifter, large pry bar, shovel, pick, eye protection, newspaper to wrap your fossils in, collecting bags, wide brimmed hat, suntan lotion, lots of water, lunch, There is no shade morning, afternoon, and it can be hot, but it will probably be cool, so dress accordingly, layers. After 1pm or so the dig site will be in the shade as the sun moves to the West, the holes are East facing. I would recommend a day pack, to put your tools in. It's a bit of a walk and it will be easier carrying your gear.

Material to Collect: Shark teeth fossils, many types, sizes, from the Miocene Epoch 10-15 millions years ago. There are other fossils, bone fragments, teeth to be found. The fossils are found in a layer about 3', you will see the exposed holes from previous digs. They are in semi-soft clay that you will dig out the biggest pieces you can, then carefully break apart to find the fossils. I usually use a gad pry bar to dig out bigger pieces of the clay, about golf ball to baseball size or so, If I see any sign of a shark tooth or fossil, I'll wrap it into newspaper and later I will use dental tools or dremel motor tool to remove the clay to reveal the tooth. I keep some of the teeth still in the matrix, it makes a nice display. The main thing is patience when working with fossils.




Books for Schools 2010—Oxnard Show---Our State Rock Under Attack

Hello, Educators! You have probably settled into the new school year's routine by now. Someone from our organization has most likely been by your school in the month of September to give you a present to welcome you back.

The books from our "Books for Schools 2010" program have been mostly delivered. Simi Valley is the exception. They, along with the schools where the principles were not available to accept the donation, are the only ones who have not received the three Smithsonian Books, *Earth, Rock and Gem and the Fossil Handbook*. These last books will not be delivered until early November. They have been very well received. Most of the Principles have been surprised at the quality of these fine books. Hopefully, your Principle has presented them to you at a staff meeting so you have had a chance to "get acquainted" with them. These books are meant to give you something of a "reference core" for your earth science studies. Take some time to look them over to see how they can help you in your classes. These three books are joining our 2009 book selection delivered last March. We are looking at one book and a couple of CD's as our next year's possible selection.

As is true of our Earth Science Kit (rock box), that many of you already have in your schools, the funds have been provided by the Coastal Chapter of the American Petroleum Institute. They are very generous to us, helping get you what you need to teach Earth Sciences to your students. The book program was conceived when a teacher was showing us her classroom books—the newest one dated 1962. API and our committee want Ventura County kids to have the best Earth Science Education in the State!

Free Stuff for Teachers

- We have 6 posters to give out to you (4 are brand new).
- The teacher theme packet will be on "Volcanoes", a hot topic, to be sure. The packet was the idea of Jim Brace-Thompson, the author of the Manual that goes with the Earth Science Kit, for the Ventura Show last March. We have all our information on the subject gathered together in the packet, with *the two new volcano posters*. There are, also, some handouts from the U.S. Geological Survey and a CD with lots of volcano pictures, models of volcanoes, info on Icelandic, Hawaiian, Cascadian and our own Conejo Volcano among other things. There are at least 75 volcano packets with posters for teachers. Be sure to bring your Teacher I.D. or something to prove you are home schooling your kids! You can't get a packet without an I.D.
- More than 900 pieces of 21 publications that you can look over and choose what you would like to take.

Free Stuff for Kids

- 58 full sets of free Dino cards for the Dino Discovery--36 different cards available. All the kids have to do is to go to a booth offering a card and read the Dino Fact and they will be given a dinosaur trading card.

- Pebble Pup Challenge—10 question “scavenger hunt” with the answers found in the display cases. Prizes include quartz crystals, copper minerals, sharks teeth and dino pencils among other things they can choose.
- Coloring pages for the younger kids, dinos and crystals to color.

For Everyone

- Touch rocks and Ugly Rocks (Cinderella Rocks) Everyone, especially kids are invited to touch, feel and lift rocks and crystals
- Fossils from Ventura Gem & Minerals Museum--How big was the Tyrannosaurus Rex head or a dino leg bone?
- Guests including the Ventura County Library, Women in Mining, and David Mautz showing how to clean fossils.

Paid Activities (The most expensive should still fit in a child’s allowance)

- 270 Dino Dig molds--This brand new activity is our most expensive activity at \$2. The child (or adult) chooses their piece that has one of 12 different dinos buried in it. They can be a paleontologist -- take it home or dig it at the show with a toothpick. There is a piece of the dino, such as a foot exposed to show them where to start. Lots of fun (I have dug a dozen myself). We are considering doing teacher pack of 10 each at a reduced rate. We will let you know before the show if we have enough to do that. If so, they will be limited to probably a hundred. They will go early—these things are addictive!!
- Make a Fossil—Our most popular activity in years past. The kids pick out the “fossils” they want in their cast, and then imprint them in a mold for their own fossil to take home. This activity is \$1. If you have scouts, this is one of their badge activities.
- Egg carton rock kits—These kits contain 6 different rocks and cost \$1. We will have at least 180 of these. Over 200 of them sold out by early Sunday last year. Lots of teachers bought them for their classes. This year we will have a volcanic set and possibly more. More in the next newsletter.
- Diamond Dan publications—These \$1 books are great for kids and a big value for their price.
- Dove Books “Rocks & Minerals” \$1.50 good for the budding rockhound.

All of this in addition to the 60 or 70 cases of gems, minerals, fossils and meteorites on display plus a whole room full of dealers next door. Don’t forget the Ventura County Ballet Company will be performing the Nutcracker in the big auditorium across the sidewalk from us! A great day for you and your kids! Parking and entrance to the Gem show are both free both days. Can’t beat that for value!

California State Rock on Rocky Ground

Serpentine, California’s State Rock, is a rock that in the new age vernacular helps you find “inner peace”. That is not what has been happening for the past 6 month for those geologist and “rock people” following Senate Bill 624 through our legislature. My interest in the bill was mainly due to the serpentine rocks included in our school rock kits and given away to teachers and kids at our rock shows. So should I tell all of you to take your serpentine out of the boxes and put it in a hazardous waste container?

When Sen. Gloria Molina first brought the bill before our State Senate it pertained to composting. After it

passed the wording was changed to repealing Serpentine as the state rock because it contains “asbestos”. After the explosion of criticism directed at her and still raging on the internet. The wording was again change to just say “It is the intent of the Legislature to remove serpentine as the state rock and lithologic emblem”. Then the bill died in committee.

Serpentine is found almost nowhere else but in California. It is a metamorphic product, mostly of the sea floor. 42 of California’s 58 counties have serpentine and soils derived from it cover a great deal of our state. Most of it is in the Coast range and Sierra foothills where island arcs were slapped up against the continent in times past. It comes in beautiful colors. It is easily carved and has a nice smooth “greasy” feel even in its natural state. This would recommend it for “State Rock” position. Why would it suddenly come into question? 2,500 die each year from asbestos related cancer in the U.S. The vast majority of these cases are caused by job related exposures, followed by environment related exposures such as asbestos tiles, shingles, paper, car parts etc. The cancers develop from breathing the fibers. Relatively few are thought to be from any naturally occurring asbestos that is free in our air. Serpentine is really a “family” of related rocks. One of these many rocks contains chrositile. So there is some small amount of foundation for the allegation, but with the chrositile bound in the rock is there much of a risk?

U.S. Rep. Devin Nunes, speaking on the great importance of the type of legislation that is keeping California from passing a budget said about the battle “Keep in mind, geologists and scientists aren't the ones making the cancer risk claim. Trial lawyers and activists are. They see this law as the only cow they value – a cash cow. Once signed into law, they will be able to file lawsuits across the state – and not just against businesses that have used the rock for landscaping, jewelry or other purposes. Anyone with the rock on their property will be open to litigation.” So that would mean that if you own land with serpentine on it, which is most of California, that anyone downwind from you could sue you.

Well, politics is not my “soapbox”, education is. So I have double checked with our geologist contacts at both the California Geological Survey and the Bureau of Land Management and both concur. As long as you aren’t grinding it up and breathing in the dust (under that application, the windows in your classroom are even toxic substances!), your serpentine samples should not be a problem for your students to handle. Rep. Molina says she will get this legislation passed. Should you hear of it coming to life again—remember that you have a bunch of geologists on your payroll already. Call one at the State Geological Survey in Sacramento, the United States Geological Survey, the Bureau of Land Management or the Forest Service, even. These people are there for you and by the way all have educational websites for teachers and kids. (That’s where I get my best activities!)

We are off on a trip across the U.S. and I will try to bring back some interesting rocks for you. See you at the show the weekend before Thanksgiving!
